## Citizenship Classes in Progress



The HLC has been offering citizenship classes in conjunction with Caribe, a program operated by the Hillsborough County Public School system. The classes prepare people who are on track to take their citizenship tests. The course covers the questions on the test, how to do the interview, and other aspects related to the citizenship process, such as registration and legal issues. The class is currently running at the Arthenia L. Joyner University Area Community Library. It will also be at Town 'N Country Regional Library (Slated to begin April 6), and at SouthShore Regional Library (begin date is June 9).

Note: at the time of publication, library closing due to the coronavirus are affecting services. The citizenship course is currently on hold at the Arthenia L. Joyner Library, and library services will not resume before the Town 'N Country scheduled start date.

## Annual Appreciation Event to Be Held at New Location


